## 2018–19 Sherl K. Coleman and Margaret E. Guitteau Teaching Professorship in the Humanities

### Coleman-Guitteau Professorship Objectives

The Coleman-Guitteau Professorship seeks to promote the development of new or substantially revised interdisciplinary undergraduate humanities courses which **focus on significant intellectual and cultural questions and their history.**

Coleman-Guitteau courses should employ pedagogical approaches that emphasize:

- open and critical thinking
- active student participation
- independent inquiry
- the free exchange of ideas

While Coleman-Guitteau courses must be designed and intended primarily for undergraduates, they may also be open to graduate students.

### \$4,000 Course Enrichment

The Coleman-Guitteau Professorship provides **up to \$4,000** for:

- curriculum development
- course enrichment
- guest speakers
- instructional materials
- classroom activities
- related research assistance
- other activities related to the approved course

These funds must be used by the end of the term during which the course is offered. Please note that these course enrichment funds are **in lieu of, not in addition to**, the regular Teaching Fellowship's \$1,000 course enrichment funds.

### \$4,500 in Summer Salary

Coleman-Guitteau Professors must devote a **minimum of four consecutive weeks** to course development during the summer of 2018. In return, they will receive \$4,500 (plus OPE) in summer salary support.

### Team-Teaching Proposals Encouraged

Team-taught courses are eligible for a single Coleman-Guitteau award of up to \$4,000 in course enrichment funds. In the case of a team-taught course, each instructor will receive \$4,500 (plus OPE) in summer salary for curriculum development. Team-taught courses are encouraged, particularly those involving faculty from different departments.

### Application Process

The Coleman-Guitteau Teaching Professorship is awarded annually on a competitive basis **in conjunction with an Oregon Humanities Center Teaching Fellowship.**

Faculty members wishing to be considered for this professorship must:

- complete the Coleman-Guitteau Professorship **Proposal Statement** (see reverse)
- attach the Proposal Statement to the **Oregon Humanities Center Teaching Fellowship application**

The Coleman-Guitteau Professor(s) will be selected by the Oregon Humanities Center Director in consultation with a review panel drawn from the Center's Advisory Board.

Applicants may not apply for both the Coleman-Guitteau Professorship and the Wulf Professorship.
