- 3** **Stephen Erickson**, Visiting Lecturer, Lyon Professor of the Humanities and Professor of Philosophy, Pomona College, discusses his book *The (Coming) Age of Thresholding*, his interest in the future of human spirituality, and the role of philosophy in negotiating changes in the way culture and religion intersect.
