Strange Weather: From the Collections of Jordan D. Schnitzer and His Family Foundation

Through April 7, 2024

Strange Weather features contemporary art works which illuminate and reframe the boundaries of bodies and the environment. The artworks included in the exhibition span five decades, from 1970–2020, and are drawn together for how they creatively call attention to the impact and history of forced migrations, industrialization, global capitalism, and trauma on humans and the contemporary landscape.

Touching upon themes of memory and nostalgia, cultural heritage, written language, production and industry, and the significance of specific locales, this exhibition examines how these spaces have impacted the histories, cultures, and identities of people throughout the Korean Peninsula.

Artists, Constellations, and Connections: Feminist Futures

The exhibition "Artists, Constellations, and Connections: Feminist Futures," organized as part of the 50th anniversary of the Center for the Study of Women in Society, engages complex histories and intersectional feminist inquiry in the context of great social, political and environmental change.

Half the Sky: Women in Chinese Art

Through July 7, 2024

In celebration of the 50th anniversary of the University of Oregon's Center for the Study of Women in Society (CSWS), the museum has organized a special exhibition entitled "Half the Sky: Women in Chinese Art," referencing Chairman Mao Zedong's 1968 quotation "Women hold up half the sky," meaning that they are the equal of men. The varied works on display attest to the remarkable resilience and creativity of women despite their relatively low status in traditional Chinese society due to Confucian and Buddhist value systems that deemed them to be inferior.

"Woman was the Sun" | Art of Japanese Women

New initiative supports graduate student success

The Oregon Humanities Center, in collaboration with the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS), has created a new initiative to pay tuition and travel expenses for two UO humanities PhD students to attend the <u>National Humanities Center's (NHC) Graduate Student</u> <u>Summer Residency</u> in Research Triangle Park, North Carolina.

This in-person NHC residency (July 15–19, 2024) offers graduate students an opportunity to learn about and experience best practices in teaching and learning. Students working in teams create materials ready for the job market, learn grantwriting skills, engage with public scholarship, and discuss humanities-focused careers inside and outside the academy.

The design of the residency requires direct work among students from different universities and disciplines, creating opportunities to engage with a broad network of humanities professionals.

This year's participants will be selected from a pool of applicants nominated by directors of graduate studies in CAS humanities-related departments that offer PhDs.

CURE offers undergraduate humanities research opportunity

The Center for Undergraduate Research and Engagement (CURE), in partnership with the Oregon Humanities Center, has initiated its inaugural Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship (SURF) Humanities Award this year. SURF is offered for fulltime undergraduate summer research conducted under the mentorship of a UO faculty member. SURF recipients receive a \$5000 stipend and faculty mentors a \$1,000 stipend. Applicants must have a faculty mentor identified and a research proposal at the time of application.

UO humanities-related faculty are encouraged to identify students who could assist with their research over the summer and encourage them to apply for SURF. The application deadline is April 30, 2024. Full details can be found at <u>urds.uoregon.edu/</u> <u>cure-awardsSURF</u>

Graduate student reports on NHC podcasting institute

The National Humanities Center's virtual podcasting institutes

provide hands-on, immersive training to translate research, commentary, and community-engaged narratives into podcast episodes. The OHC's new initiative provides institute tuition for a graduate student in January and faculty in June. The OHC accepts applications for future NHC podcasting institutes each fall.



During the week of January 8–12, 2024, I was fortunate to be a part of a wonderful group of around 80 graduate students from across the nation and disciplines in the immersive week-long National Humanities Podcast Institute—the virtual workshop that trained us to develop "collaborative, public-facing, research-based humanities content using digital media."

My podcast cohort included three other graduate students from California and Virginia. Together we created a podcast titled "Cultivating Wholeness as a Graduate Student." In this podcast, the four of us discussed what we are doing to cultivate wholeness and face the challenges that come with graduate school. Our stories demonstrate a shared belief that cultivating wholeness means more than becoming a well-rounded individual, but a process of self-discovery and a practice of authenticity. It was both difficult and inspirational to create an original audio work virtually and in such a short time.

Moving forward, I plan to use the skills I gained in the podcast institute to collaborate with my colleagues in public health to tell audio stories of important community-based health advocacy efforts, discuss key barriers to health equity, and explore responses to address fundamental social drivers of health inequities moving forward. Through podcasting, we will gather voices from impacted community members, leaders of local health organizations, public health officials, and advocates addressing these issues. A major goal of this podcast project is to add depth and understanding to contemporary public health equity efforts that are applicable to a range of potential audience members through a public podcast.
